

WHAT COUNTS FOR WHAT...

Some programs in the College of Human Ecology allow you to choose elective courses in one or more areas included in "General Requirements," e.g., in humanities or natural sciences. Here's a reference list to help you identify possible courses to meet those elective requirements. Consult your adviser before enrolling.

PLEASE NOTE:

- Each college has its own rules...this information applies **ONLY** to degree programs in the College of Human Ecology. If you are completing dual degrees from different Colleges (e.g. NUEX and KIN), you need to comply with criteria set by each of the Colleges involved. Consult the K-State Undergraduate Catalog, your adviser or the Dean's Office.
- Two programs (Early Childhood Education and Communication Sciences and Disorders) have restrictions. See additional information below.
- One hour courses in these areas are acceptable only if they are laboratories accompanying a course, such as PHYS 101 and PHYS 103, or if they are a sequential series of two or more courses, such as CIS 101 and 102, 103 or 104. Other one hour courses apply only as **UNRESTRICTED ELECTIVES**.
- Only courses numbered 100 through 799 can be applied toward undergraduate degrees.

Additional Information for

EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION (ECE) and COMMUNICATION SCIENCES AND DISORDERS (CSD) MAJORS:

- ❖ Communication courses, other than Expository Writing I and II and Public Speaking, **CANNOT** be used to complete the general education requirements
- ❖ ENGL 355 Literature for Children and ENGL 545 Literature for Adolescents **CANNOT** be used to satisfy the literature/language requirement in ECE or the humanities requirement in CSD
- ❖ Consult the Director of Licensure (BH 013) about application of two credit courses, AMETH, GERON and WOMST courses in ECE and CSD.
- ❖ Only BIOL courses will apply for biological science electives in ECE and CSD
- ❖ ECE and CSD majors are required to have at least one physical science course, which is **neither** math, computer science **nor** statistics. (PHYS 101 and 103 are strongly recommended for CSD majors.)
- ❖ EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION (ECE) majors must have at least nine credits in social science **NOT** including psychology.
 - Only selected anthropology courses will apply as social science courses in ECE and CSD
 - MC and FSHS courses **WILL NOT APPLY** as social science in ECE and CSD
